Gender and Development Corner

What is Gender and Development?

Gender and Development (GAD) refers to the development perspective and process that is participatory and empowering, equitable, sustainable, free from violence, respectful of human rights, supportive of self-determination and actualization of human potentials. It seeks to achieve gender equality as a fundamental value that should be reflected in development choices and contends that women are active agents of development, not just passive recipients of development.

Caroline Moser developed the Moser Gender Planning Framework for GAD-Oriented development planning in the 1980's while working at the Development Planning Unit of the University of London. Working with Caren Levy, she expanded it into a methodology for Gender and Development approach in emphasizing the importance of gender relations.



GAD was developed in the 1980s as an alternative to Women in Development (Approach)

Unlike WID, the **GAD** approach is not concerned specifically with women, but with the way in which society assigns roles, responsibilities and expectations to both women and men.

GAD applies gender analysis to uncover the ways in which men and women work together, presenting results in neutral terms of economics and efficiency.
