the Davao Oriental Industrial Park on Tuesday, March 21, 2018.

The project with an estimated cost of \$24-billion, is a partnership project between the Provincial Government of Davao Oriental and a Hong Kong-based financing company, in Barangay Maputi, Banaybanay, Davao Oriental.

After that very important event, Secretary Mamondiong made a layover at Lupon School of Fisheries as part of his itinerary for the day.

In a mini conference at the APACC room of the School, the Director-General assured the LSF family of his support especially on the School's bid to change its name from Lupon School of Fisheries to Davao Oriental Polytechnic Institute.

Moreover, the Secretary gave instruction to the newly installed OIC-DDG for Communities and Local Government Units Gaspar Gayona, PhD and the new Regional Director of TESDA XI, Engr. Lorenzo G. Macapili to give special budget allocations in support of the School's continuous infrastructure improvements.

After that brief but very fruitful stint and a no-frills lunch, the 9-vehicle convoy of DG Mamondiong left Lupon School of Fisheries and the Province of Davao Oriental at large with a commitment of making the School a Premiere TESDA Technology Institution in this side of the presidential region.

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When gold meets gold: LSF visits PPSAT

A three-day benchmarking cum team building endeavor from July 25-27, 2018 at the City of Puerto Princesa in Palawan was a success.

For day one, a very warm welcome, well curated and carefully-thought-off activities was set for the visiting LSF personnel by the host operating unit, the Puerto Princesa School of Arts and Trades (PPSAT).

After a sumptuous meal and a nifty hibernation of sorts from a virtually 12-hour trip from Lupon to Puerto Princesa, a short program tagged along as part of the orientation on the journey of both schools towards achieving the first two gold accreditations by APACC.

LSF shared through an audio-video presentation, the whats and hows of the second visit leading to the first ever gold for the Philippines.

For their share of the bargain, PPSAT gave a presentation which showcased their best practices including a project-based research published in an international research journal, a milestone in itself, which cemented their stature as an APACC gold certified public TESDA technology institution.

A short open forum some very essential Q & As and a campus tour followed suit for the visiting personnel to see and appreciate the actual set-up and innovations made by the host school.

On day 2 and 3 respectively, a half-day visit at the world's famous Puerto Princesa subterranean river and a city tour to include the ranch of once Speaker of the House Ramon Mitra Jr, Palawan Crocodile Nature Park, Tribal Village, Baker's Hill, Binuatan Creations, Plaza Cuartel and the city tiangges for some pasalubong stuff among others was arranged to the delight of the wayfarers who were smiling from ear to ear.

On the Saturday July 28, 2018, it was time to say farewell from a three-day sojourn at the City of Puerto Princesa.

Indeed, Lupon School of Fisheries' APACC journey towards getting that elusive first gold accreditation for the Philippines inspired others to dream for their own, PPSAT included. The second started their own journey with the end of getting another gold for the country because it had the chops to get out of its own way while the first served to inspire.

For every single step then, taken with a fair amount of goodwill, one shall surely thump its way towards hitting the goal and getting the gold. So that when LSF decided to visit PPSAT and the latter did look and act the part, it was then that gold met gold.
